Notes from the Editor – Susan H. Holland

Obtaining operating funds to keep the American Hemerocallis Society (AHS) financially sound and moving forward is always of concern to the national and regional staff, directors and representatives. The new AHS President, Nicki Schmidt, is spunky, creative, and uses her abundant energy on behalf of the AHS. She, with the help of others, created a new, fun way to encourage members to support the national organization, which in turn, greatly benefits the regional clubs.

On January 15, 2017, the inaugural Facebook Fundraiser Auction to benefit the AHS General Fund began on the official Facebook Page - www.facebook.com/ahsdaylilies/. There were so many unusual offerings from the imaginative members who donated their services, vacation homes, quilts, pottery, art work, stained glass, and once in a lifetime visits with hybridizers. The list was long, complex, and very exciting.

Because I work with graphics and images preparing the *Daylily Pioneer*, I bid on the virtual live training session in Using Photoshop with AHS webmaster Tim Fehr (25 seats at \$50 fixed-price per seat). The actual event was great, and helped me understand how much I do know about Photoshop and how much more there is to learn.

Tim Fehr, the instructor, and webmaster for AHS, asked us before the on-line event to submit one or more images that needed "help" so he could show us the capabilities of Photoshop. Below is an example of what the program can do.

The production of the *Daylily Pioneer* is a labor of love for me. Part of the fun is learning new software called Adobe Creative Cloud. One purchases a yearly subscription, and the programs associated with the plans vary. I have the simplest – A photography plan. This gives me access to Lightroom and Photoshop,

which are updated automatically as improvements are made. It is a "cloud" based program, so your bits and pieces of design, colors, photos, layouts, and fonts are all stored in your "library" on the cloud, accessible to you with whatever tool you are using – desktop computer, phone, laptop, etc.

The Region One Board provides the Editor with a subscription to a layout program called InDesign, which provides the ability to "lay out" formats and save them for future use, lessening the time required with each newsletter issue I produce. At this point the learning curve is substantial, but I am glad I am knowledgeable about and have been using print production photography and layout tools for over 30 years. Hope it does not take me that long to learn InDesign!



Wonderland Gardens Jenn & Steve Lanz

Newport (MN)

You don't have to go down a rabbit hole for this adventure! Jenn's own sunset wonderland will greet you as soon as you step off the bus.

Jenn loves the warm colors of sunset— red, orange, yellow, coral and white—and she has re-created a sunset in her garden. She is a collector, so with only a couple of exceptions, you will usually not find just one of a variety in her gardens.

A couple of years ago, Jenn began to replace the border annuals with hundreds of different hens and chicks. All of her plantings, her one-of-a-kind pathway (built by her husband and pieced together by



her), and their house, reflect her love of plants that bloom with hot colors.

A collection of hardy cacti and succulents along the hand-crafted walkway will welcome you. Then you can follow along the sunset paths through the front yard where blooming perennials have replaced

all grass.

As you continue to the backyard, you will discover the majority of Jenn's daylilies, irises, and lilies (especially Martagon lilies). Over 500 daylily cultivars are in her collection at this time.


On the back berm you will find the

It all started with a new home purchase in September of 2012. The house happened to come on a lot that was almost one acre in size. Dave spent the first spring cutting out and digging up 15 pine trees and pulling out overgrown bushes.

Year by year, he removed more trees and added more gardens. He decided he also needed to fence the backyard to prevent visits from the local—and hungry—deer.

In the fall of 2015, Linda and Dave married. Together, they have continued to fill the gardens with newer and more daylilies, as well as with companion plants. Dave has great fun finding unique yard art to complement the flowers.

Bill and Dory Lidinsky Garden

Ham Lake (MN)

The Lidinsky gardening adventure began about 25 years ago, when they noticed the attractive large clumps of *H. fulva* in the neighbor's yard. They looked on-line and bought about eight double fans of *H.* 'Purple Waters' (Russell 1942) and have been exponentially expanding their collection ever since.

About nine years ago, they moved to a new home in Ham Lake (MN) that sits on a one-acre lot. They have been adding two-to-three new beds per year as they needed more garden space. Their garden currently has about a fifty-fifty mix of well-marked seedlings and cultivars, all showing results of attentive culture and irrigation.

About 10 years ago, they began to hybridize. Their initial goal was to create cultivars that have large flowers, a high bud count, instant re-bloom, and hardiness in their



yard. They met those goals and then had planned to continue to work on the flowers. Meanwhile, the daylilies had their own ideas and started telling them that they wanted to see crested flowers... Their current goal is to create cultivars that have large crested blooms that occur greater than 80% of the time.

The Lidinsky Gardens offers views of open countryside beyond swaths

of bright daylilies that flow through their gently rolling yard. Visitors will also notice touches of garden ornaments and companion plants but the daylilies are the main show here!

Be sure to look in the Lidinsky Garden for the Bryan Culver cultivars that will be in the Culver auction on Saturday after the banquet.













Judie McGraw Garden Lakeland (MN)

It all started with what was going to be a short trip to Norm Baker's North Star Daylily Nursery, which used to be a favorite daylily destination for local daylily collectors. Three hours later, Judie was still admiring daylilies in one bed after another. After several visits to Norm's along with many

daylily purchases, her perennial gardens gradually became daylily gardens.


Judie's garden is on a peaceful one-half-acre suburban lot, which features over 500 daylily cultivars in beds around the perimeter and in curving island beds. Varieties include all types of new and classic daylilies, including a collection of doubles.



A waterfall greets visitors in the entry garden, while the cul-desac is also planted with more daylilies. Companion perennials, Itoh peonies, ornamental shrubs, and grasses complement the daylilies. Pine and spruce surround the garden, along with crab trees, hydrangeas, and 'White Silk' Japanese tree lilacs. Shady areas feature hostas, astilbe and ferns.

If you look carefully, you might also catch a glimpse of hidden fairy gardens and a gnome village.





Springwood Gardens Garden of Dick and Karol Emmerich

Jordan (MN)

Dick and Karol Emmerich's
Springwood Gardens sits high on
a wind-swept hill overlooking the
Minnesota River valley. A wide
umbrella of sky stretches as far as
the eye can see. It is an amazing
place to watch the seasons change
and the storms pass by. The vinecovered house with its stone walls,
green shutters and coral bricks will
transport you to another time and
place.

Flowers and wine-colored shrubbery fill the gardens. The courtyard gardens and areas adjacent to the house feature many interesting perennials which flower in May/June and mid-August through September. But in July and August, the daylilies are what will capture your heart. You can see approximately 25,000 daylily seedlings in various stages of evaluation and about 300 named cultivars, including 173 of Karol's. Todate, Karol's introductions have won 5 Awards of Merit, 39 Honorable Mentions, and 2 Specialty Awards from the American Hemerocallis Society.

Springwood started out as a place to grow daylily seedlings, but it soon turned into a project that will keep Dick and Karol busy and inspired for the rest of their lives. Numerous bronze statues add year-round interest, while concrete walkways throughout provide accessibility, and an arborvitae hedge to the south and east of the garden elicits a sense of enclosure. Massive boulder walls and granite staircases to nowhere add to the charm. Buildings of interest on the property include the old one-room schoolhouse now serving as the local town hall, Karol's greenhouse,

the shipping building, Dick's workshop, and the old house built in 1862 (renovated in 2011, so Dick and Karol could live there full time). Visitors will find places to sit throughout, and the courtyard in front of the house is a great spot to take it all in.

Even if you have visited Springwood many times before, you can see thousands of new seedlings (don't forget to visit the gravel pit across the street from the main garden where about 10,000 of them are located) and enjoy new landscaping features.

Springwood Gardens is the site of Garden Judges Workshop 2 on Sunday, 10:00 a.m.–12:00 noon, Mary Baker, GJW2 Chair/Instructor. All attendees are invited to a hot breakfast buffet (included with registration), 8:30–10:00 a.m. Garden visiting hours are Sunday, 11:00 A.M.–2:00 P.M.

Are You Ready for GE Daylilies?

Survey Data

In my recent article "Genetically Engineering those Blues?" in The Daylily Pioneer, Fall 2016, pp. 8-11, I described how biotech companies have since the mid-1980s attempted to create blue carnations and roses by genetic engineering (GE). Since the same experimental approaches could be used with daylilies, it is possible that GE Hemerocallis could be produced in the nottoo-distant future. Having said that, please keep in mind that biotech companies would only invest time, corporate funding, and skilled personnel in engineering daylilies and overcoming the necessary regulatory hurdles if they sensed that they would receive a good return on their investment. I encouraged our readers to complete a questionnaire that might gauge just how comfortable they might be with GE daylilies.

From the 10 responses received, I drew the following tentative conclusions. Although most respondents were not concerned about GE food/food plants and were even less concerned about GE ornamental crops, only two had great confidence in the ability of the U.S. federal agencies to decide which GE food crops/ornamental crops should be approved for commercialization (Questions a-c). This author was one of only two respondents who knew that "Moon series" carnations were genetically engineered (Question d).

This perhaps reflects the strategy



of sellers not to disclose this information, given the anxiety that most people in United States share about GE organisms (ABCNEWS.com survey, 2016).

In 2006, a survey of Tennessee Master Gardeners revealed that almost three-quarters would very likely or somewhat likely buy GE ornamentals or grasses if plant cost, appearance, and size were the same as their non-GE counterparts (Klingeman et al., 2006). This positive regard for GE plants was also displayed by our Region One survey participants. All would definitely (7/10) or perhaps (3/10) purchase a GE daylily if it displayed traits that they found important (e.g. true blue flowers, rust resistance, long-lasting blooms) (Question g). Furthermore, all but one would fully integrate the GE Hemerocallis cultivars into their collection and not segregate them from other daylilies (Question h). Seventy percent of respondents would use the GE daylilies in their

hybridization programs, thereby allowing desirable genes to pass to future generations (Question i). Finally, like the Tennessee Master Gardeners who overwhelmingly favored that GE plants be labeled as such at time of sale, 60% of our survey participants had the same preference (Question e) and wanted GE daylilies and cultivars derived from a GE parent annotated as such in the AHS database (Question f).

On July 22, we have our daylily garden tours in the ever-delightful





Selvyn Rash Interview with Susan Holland

Selwyn-tell me about your garden.

Our garden name is Amazing Days Garden, 1621 Dewitt, Ellsworth, Iowa, and it is owned by me, Selwyn Rash, and my wife, Mary Kay Rash.

When did you begin thinking about hybridizing daylilies?

I planted my first seedlings at Don Lovell's Timbercreek Garden in 2007, wanting to see positive and enjoyable results. And the thought of all the MONEY I could make was encouraging! (I wasn't dealing with reality at that point!)

What is your hybridizing focus?

I purposely focus on tetraploids, due to space limitations. I acquired the best cultivars I could afford at the time. I found out the hard way that many Southern plants, as they are, couldn't endure an lowa winter. We live and learn!

Do you have a specific goal in mind for what you want your seedlings and selections to look like?

Initially, I wanted to develop a 'black' northern hardy daylily, so I acquired stock that I thought would lead me in that direction. The name 'Phantom's Mask' has been (hopefully) reserved for that plant.

I'm also working on orange cultivars, because I think they are so attractive, but I've found out that many 'by-products' can be VERY special too!

Focuses change! Obviously, the flower must be eye-catching, but it must be borne on a well branched and budded scape, coming from a plant that thrives in our climate.

Registering a plant that I would be remembered by has taken on more priority. Vain as it may be, a part of ME, living on, that my family, friends, and others would enjoy, has become my goal. And, I think I'm getting there!

What daylilies do you use most frequently as parents?

On the 'dark side', my best performer has been Chris Rogers' (2006) 'Geneva Black Shadow' (inaccurately identified in the Fall/Winter 2015 *Daylily Pioneer*). Many of Karol Emmerich's purples have gone into the mix, and more recently, her 'All Things To All Men' has been an

outstanding parent both ways! I've also used Bob Selman's 'Blue Corn Moon' extensively. Keep in mind, this is a backyard garden, so I'm limited!

What advice would you give someone just starting out with hybridizing?

Keep an open mind. Use the best parent stock that you can afford in your growing area. Within reason, don't limit yourself so that you are constricted by form, color, or ploidy. It's all a well-informed crap-shoot! I use what happens to be open on a given day, depending on weather, temperatures, etc. You never know

what surprises await! And it's worth the gamble! What really matters is what YOU, the grower, receive
